


Thursday, March 23: A Texas wildlife story - Deep in the Heart with writer/director Ben Masters



Ben Masters is a filmmaker and writer specializing in wildlife and adventure stories. He is most known for directing the feature-length documentary *The River and The Wall* (SXSW 2019 award winner) and for producing *Unbranded* (Mountainfilm 2015 Audience Award winner). Masters studied wildlife biology at Texas A&M University and founded <u>Fin and Fur Films</u>, a production company specializing in short films featuring wildlife research, conservation, and activism. A proud Texan, Masters loves riding a good horse through new country, filming wildlife stories that haven't been documented before, and using movies to help conserve wildlife and wild places.

Official Trailer: <u>Deep in the Heart</u>

Deep in the Heart is a visually stunning celebration of what makes Texas unique — its diverse landscapes and remarkable wildlife behavior that cannot be found anywhere else in the world. Told through the eyes of wildlife species ranging from the mysterious blind catfish to the elusive mountain lion, the story follows our ever-changing relationship with the natural world and showcases our ability to destroy, conserve, and recover wildlife and the habitat we mutually depend on.



Narrated by Matthew McConaughey and featuring state-of-the-art cinematography, this family-friendly film journeys from the highest

peaks in West Texas, through our aquifers, rivers, and bays, and deep into the Gulf of Mexico. Deep in the Heart aims to conserve our remaining wild places, to show the connectivity of water and wildlife, and to recognize Texas' conservation importance on a continental scale.

9th Grade News

Geometry

Students have been working on proving triangles congruent. We will be moving into right triangles next and then into similar figures. We will have a project with similar figures that will tie into the virtue project that the students have started in ELA.

English

Students have finished the study of The Four Agreements and are moving into the play Twelve Angry Men, focusing on bias, the agreements, characterization, and analytical writing. Students will also participate in a simulation of the United Nations researching and advocating as a delegate of a country. Topics include reproductive rights of women, the ethical repatriation of artifacts, and ethics of cults. Students begin prep upon their return from Spring Break and will participate in the simulation Thursday, March 30 during 5th and 6th periods.

Students are also in the midst of their virtue project. They have chosen a virtue to track throughout the literature we've read and in other pieces of lit, film, songs, blogs, videos. etc. and will create a digital piece as well as a maker piece. Parents will be able to enjoy the students' virtue projects and creations on the evening of May 17 during our annual parent showcase night.

World Geography

Geography is in the middle of our 4th Unit, Europe. The students are working on their Passion Projects where the students get to choose their topic of research as long as they can relate it back to Europe. They will then teach the class about it in a video presentation that will be watched in small groups for discussions. They've chosen some really cool topics and I'm excited to see what they come up with for it! We have about two weeks left in Europe and then will be moving on to our Africa Unit in February! 10th Grade News

We are constantly engaging our Classical Academy sophomores to expand on their discoveries of Truth, Beauty and Goodness as they learn to think logically, write persuasively, speak eloquently, and live ethically.

English

Students are in the process of finishing the play Antigone. They are looking at how a play written 500+ years B.C.E. is still relevant and how the issues they grappled with in some of the first plays ever written are the same issues people deal with today. They will be required to *Think Logically, Write Persuasively, and Speak Eloquently* in group projects to connect the ancient play to modern issues. Students will later start a biography/autobiography unit with a book of their choice, as well as read the graphic novel *Maus*.

World History

Students just finished learning about World War I through class lectures and a trench warfare simulation (paper balls only!). They will soon be engaging in a "Paper Cranes for Peace Project" by making origami paper cranes to *Live Ethically* in the hopes of never experiencing nuclear war.

Algebra II

Students are *Thinking Logically* about polynomial functions, and next unit they will study rational functions. Mr. Fudge will later introduce the Archeological Dig Project (where students will be able to show off their expertise with half-life problems and carbon dating by playing archeologists).

Chemistry

Students are *Thinking Logically* by exploring the different ways that atoms come together to form materials and the impacts of these bonds on material properties. Students are able to differentiate between materials, such as crystals and metals, and explain why it's unsafe to swim during a thunderstorm. For extra credit on their upcoming exam, students are able to research why some cities salt their roads before an ice storm much like the one we just had here in Austin. They will explain their findings by connecting what we have learned in class about atomic bonding to this specific and important real-world application. They will be moving on to molecules and their structures in the near future.

Aquatic Science

Students have been challenged to answer the question, "To what extent is Austin's Barton Creek Greenbelt an environmental success story?" Students are diving into the history of the ecosystem and working to identify and describe the various environmental threats to the wildlife inhabiting the area using the Barton Creek Time Stream website.

11th Grade News: American Studies

American Studies is available for the Academy for Classical Studies and the Academy for Global Studies students only. The English and US History curriculum is similar to the traditional humanities core courses at AHS as far as rigor and learning objectives, but has a more interdisciplinary pedagogy that allows for content alignment, project-based learning, and curricular connections to the ACS and AGS pillars of learning. Students will explore the American experience by analyzing literary and historical texts in order to develop a sophisticated understanding of American history and culture while growing into critical thinkers who effectively use language to communicate ideas.

12th Grade News

Seniors do not take ACS-specific courses, but many students are taking electives to help them qualify for the Graduation Distinction from the Academy for Classical Studies. To be eligible for the **Graduation Distinction**, 2023 graduates should:

- Complete 1 year of Latin and 3 Fine Arts/Humanities electives (see approved courses on <u>ACS website</u>), OR students may take 4 ACS-approved Fine Arts/Humanities electives if they opt out of Latin
- Document 70+ <u>Civic Engagement Points</u> (this number is adjusted due to Covid), and
- Complete a Senior Seminar Experience

The **Senior Seminar Experience** includes several options: the Service Learning Design Project, the Research/Thesis Track, or completion of an Internship (on-campus and off-campus internships are offered). Seniors who are hoping to earn the Graduation Distinction who are not currently enrolled in a Senior Seminar course for the fall should double check schedules and/or meet with counselors to be sure the Senior Seminar Experience is added to their schedule for the spring.

Did You Know?

Civic Engagement Points

<u>Civic Engagement Points</u> are awarded for civic engagement tasks and activities that align with the Classical Academy pillars of truth, beauty, and goodness. Check out the list of activities that can earn you points on our Academy website: <u>Truth points</u>, <u>beauty points</u>, <u>goodness points</u>.

To earn an ACS Graduation Distinction, civic engagement points must be logged, verified, and approved by May 1 of senior year.

The goal for civic engagement points is typically 80 points, but the numbers needed for distinction eligibility have been adjusted due to Covid/pandemic issues. Here's a timeline of how we are adjusting back to that expectation:

- <u>Class of 2023</u>: 70 points
- <u>Class of 2024 and beyond</u>: 80 points*

*subject to change if we are unable to plan some of our typical experiences that lead to points

For all groups, an additional award (certificate + medal) is given to students who earn 120+ hours. In ACS, this is called the *Classy Award*. This number did not change, even during the pandemic, because it's an "above and beyond" award.

Keep in mind that <u>the points are only one eligibility requirement</u>. To receive the ACS Graduation Distinction, students also need to have academy-specific **coursework** and complete the **Senior Seminar** Experience:

- Coursework = 3 Fine Arts/Humanities electives + 1 year of Latin OR 4 Fine Arts/Humanities electives, if students opt out of Latin. Those approved electives are listed on the <u>ACS website</u>.
- Senior Seminar for ACS = Thesis, Service Learning Design Project (collaborative), or Internship
